

Reviving the Past

Region member and recent Foot Warmer Editor Brad Zemcik has a recognized expertise in photography and photographic editing and design, specializing particularly in automobiles. Brad submitted an article describing what can be done to enhance photographs, especially old photographs, to turn them into stunning portraits that win people over to the car hobby. We are pleased to include this fascinating report with examples in this month's Foot Warmer.

Reviving The Past....Photographically Brad Zemcik

So much of our hobby was filmed in black and white, both stills and movies. Over the years many of we researchers could only surmise what the actual colors could be in a photo. Yes, there is an essence of "original at the time, olde world" which is heartwarming but not indicative of the true colors. For over 50 years I have been involved with documentation as many Rolls-Royces and Bentley's as possible. Several of us from various countries are continually in touch helping researchers, authors, and potential buyers, etc. We work with all kinds of photos, good and bad. So many old photos are black and white and it's hard to imagine what some of the cars really looked like when they were photographed.

As technology advances software is now becoming sophisticated enough to pull out the colors. I won't go into the technical aspects but suffice it to say it's complicated, logarithms, densities, hues, etc.

Examples of colorization:









In addition to colorization there are high end software programs where we can enhance resolution and clarity on old photos. As a caveat, not all photos or movies can be processed but many can, and results are not like a new, current high-resolution photo or video. Many of the older photos are very low resolution and not workable. Each must stand on its own merit and type and amount of information that was collected at the time the original was shot. This is not a "fix all" but can help.

Here is an example of our own Al Smithson. In the photo I was asked to work on, there are many things: The background is a mess, there is a shadow across the middle of the photo and his suit pants are a different color than the suit coat, Whose shadow is that on the right?, look at the car on the right - notice the reflections of orange cones, white parking lines..., look at how dark the wheels and chrome are, if you look closely at the Packard you can see the left window frame is brown from a reflection, look through the windows and you can see that "wonderful" background, etc.





Here is the final product after hours of work. Al has a suit that matches, if you look through each car window you can see the new background like it was meant to be there, chrome and wheels are brighter, there are no more orange cone and parking lines reflections, the Packard window frame is now black like the rest of the car, and much more. More work could have been done but for the purpose this suffices.










With other processes we can even turn some photographs into "paintings."



Sometimes the focal point, the car(s), is not in the best location. When that happens, it is necessary to edit the original photograph to enhance and highlight the essence of the car(s). Here are samples of "before and after's."
